Latisse is FDA approved. It is the brand name for bimatoprost a sister medication to Lumigan which is a treatment for glaucoma that was found to make lashes grow longer thicker and darker usually by 2 months of use and then maintenance required to keep the lashes in the anagen or the growing phase. Possible Risks (occur in less than 4% of users) but inform us if occurring.

- Eye irritation, itching
- Redness of the white part of the eye (conjunctival), eyelid redness
- Dry eye symptoms
- Although rare Latisse has the potential to permanently increase brown pigment to the iris, make sure to apply as per instructions
- May cause hyperpigmentation or darkening of the eyelid skin (can be permanent)
- May lower pressure inside the eye however the magnitude of this is not usually a concern. If you have a history of abnormal eye pressures than Latisse should only be used under the close supervision of your ophthalmologist. Inform anyone doing an eye pressure exam that you are using Latisse or if you are having eye surgery.
- Do not use if allergic to bimatoprost or any other ingredient in this product
- Only use on the skin at the base of the eyelashes on the UPPER eyelids only. Using it on the lower lids will increase your risk of hyperpigmentation to the eyelid skin.
- Discontinue Latisse and see eye doctor if eye infection, sudden decrease of vision, eye trauma or eyelid reactions.
- Consult your eye doctor before using if you are about to undergo eye procedures ie cataract surgery, if you have uveitis, macular edema, eye infection or being treated for glaucoma with eye drops.
